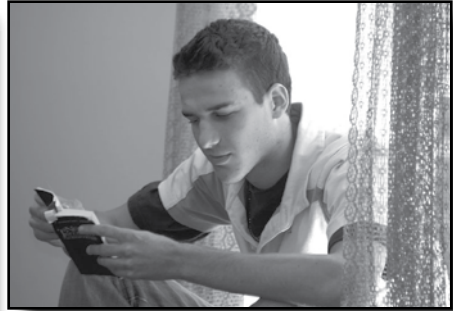


Introduction

New Brunswick Bible Institute is dedicated to the training of young people who are sincere and earnest in their desire to live for Jesus Christ. Leaving home and friends to begin Bible training means an entirely different way of life for the average young person; however, as students willingly submit

their personal lives to the discipline of the Word of God and the standards of Christian conduct and responsibility required by the school, they can expect to enjoy their time of study and to know the joy of growing in the grace and knowledge of Christ.



Spiritual Life

Devotions

The foremost goal of New Brunswick Bible Institute is the cultivation of the student's spiritual life. A Christian's personal devotional life with the Lord is of utmost importance. To this end the students are instructed in having an effective personal quiet time, and a thirty minute period in the morning and evening has been set aside in the schedule for this purpose.

Chapels and Prayer

Four days a week a thirty-minute chapel service is conducted by faculty members, guest pastors or missionaries. The chapel period each Monday is set aside for Mission Prayer Bands in which the students are divided into several groups to pray for missions around the world. The students hold weekly dorm

prayer meetings. Prayer also begins and ends each class hour.

Campus Church

Sunday services and a Thursday evening prayer meeting are held on campus for the single students. Our campus pastor provides oversight as the students learn to lead services and minister in word and song. The Sunday evening student fellowship service is conducted entirely by students.

Discipleship Opportunities

Discipleship takes place on campus in many and varied ways. Special opportunities are available for one-on-one, small group or large group discipleship, counselling and mentoring situations with other students, staff and spouses and other spiritual

leaders. Students are encouraged to avail themselves of these spiritual opportunities and relationships.

Practical Christian Service

The aim of the New Brunswick Bible Institute is to teach the Word of God in such a way that our students will recognize the divine imperative to engage in active Christian service. Students are encouraged to be faithful in speaking to individuals about their relationship to Christ.

The Bible Institute requires each student to be involved in Practical Christian Service during the school term as well as during the summer months. Credits are given and graduation is contingent upon the satisfactory completion of such service.

During the school term students gain practical experience by being involved in Sunday schools, Awana programs, Bible clubs, senior citizens' homes, youth meetings and jail meetings. Door-to-door evangelism is also a part of our Personal Evangelism course. Invitations are received by the school to minister in churches throughout the area and our students are involved in preaching ministries, musical teams and evangelistic outreach teams.



Social Life

Daily Schedule

Students are required to attend four fifty-minute classes each morning, Monday through Friday. A thirty-minute chapel is held after the second class. Afternoons are spent in sports, musical group rehearsals, student training and free time. A two-hour study hall (mandatory for single students) is held Monday through Thursday evenings, and prayer meeting is held Thursday evening. Weekends are free for study and recreation, with services held Sunday morning and evening.



Dormitory Life

The New Brunswick Bible Institute seeks to provide a friendly, relaxed yet regulated atmosphere conducive to study and to individual development in Christian living. Dormitory living plays a major role in producing Christian growth in the lives of students. Some of the greatest lessons in the student's career have been learned from fellow-students in the dormitory.

All dormitories are under the direct supervision of the deans and students who are appointed as student resident advisors. All single students are expected to live in the Institute dormitories during their freshman year. Consideration may be given to students living near the school if they request

permission to live at home during their junior and senior years.

Dormitory rooms provide accommodation for two students. Rooms are furnished with bunk beds, mattresses, study tables, chairs and closets. Curtains for windows and closets have also been provided. The cheerfulness and comfort of the room depends largely on the touches provided by the occupants. Students are expected to keep their rooms neat and clean. Daily inspection will be made by the dean or by the resident advisors.

Students are expected to provide their own towels, sheets, blankets, pillows and cleaning supplies.

Students are provided with coin-operated washing machines and dryers.

Dress

An individual's personal appearance tells much about his character. Christian young men and women should therefore form careful habits of dress and grooming which are modest, neat and discreet. All students are required to dress appropriately at all times. Extremes in dress and hair styling are not acceptable.

A dress code is sent to all students when they are accepted to come to New Brunswick Bible Institute.

Dating, Engagement and Marriage

Well-balanced Christian living demands that time be spent in relaxation and fellowship as well as in study and work. As a co-ed school, the relationships of young men and women should be friendly, natural and above reproach. The goal of the school is that

all such relationships will be both happy and wholesome. Students are therefore expected to maintain the highest Christian standards in all relationships.

New Brunswick Bible Institute recognizes the value and importance of developing mature and Christ-honouring relationships while at Bible school. We also recognize the importance of couples approaching engagement and marriage sensibly and in harmony with God's purpose and will for their lives. Therefore, the following rules apply with regard to engagement and marriage.

A. Students who wish to become engaged must first obtain permission from their parents. Engagements must not take place while school is in session.

B. No marriages will take place during the years of training at NBBI.

Sports

Student Training

The New Brunswick Bible Institute requires all students to be involved in student training on campus approximately six hours each week. This training is considered a very important part of the student's preparation for the service of Christ and a very definite part of his Christian responsibility. It is expected each one will do his part gladly and faithfully as unto the Lord.



Dental, Medical and Health Care Insurance

Those planning to attend school should have all medical, dental and optical work done before coming to school. Medical facilities are available at a nearby clinic and a local hospital, but taking time from studies and school activities is to be avoided whenever possible.

All students are encouraged to seek their own health care insurance while in attendance at NBBI.

Musical Groups

Music groups will be chosen from both on-campus programs and will be given credit for participation. They are required to participate in group tours continuing two weeks after graduation.

Motor Vehicles

Students bringing cars to school must make sure that these are

adequately insured. Proof of sufficient coverage will be required by the school before any car may be used for Christian service or other school functions. When it is considered necessary for the student's welfare, the school reserves the right to restrict the use of students' cars.

Students who use their cars for Practical Christian Service will be paid mileage according to the rates established at the beginning of the season, and these amounts will be adhered to in making payment.

No major car repairs will be done on campus without permission.

Travel Arrangements

Students travelling to and from school are expected to make arrangements for themselves and the transportation of baggage to and from train stations, airports and bus depots.

Students are expected to make their own arrangements to be off campus during school breaks. Our dormitories are closed during vacations.

Students are not allowed to miss classes, leave early or return late from breaks and vacations. In case of *emergency*, contact the deans **before** booking flights, etc.

Cross-Border Travel

NBBI is located just 30 minutes from the Canadian/US border at Belleville (Woodstock), NB/Houlton, ME. A passport, passport card or a WHTI-compliant document will be required when crossing the border.

Firearms

Students are not to bring firearms on campus except by permission for

use during hunting season. When such are brought they will be kept in a designated place.

Student Employment

Single students are not allowed to be employed off campus during the school year. Due to the academic work load, married students desiring to work while attending school must seek the approval of the staff before taking employment.

Immigration regulations do not allow non-Canadians to seek employment in Canada.

Substance Abuse/Undesirable Conduct

The use of alcohol, tobacco in any form, or non-medical drugs is not permitted at any time. While living on campus, students are expected to refrain from attending theatres or dances.

Internet Access

Students on campus have access to wireless internet at no charge.

Information for Married Students

Married students are expected to find their own living accommodations and should therefore visit the area well in advance to make suitable arrangements.

The New Brunswick Bible Institute operates a mobile home court with a limited number of sites available for rent. Anyone planning to rent a site should apply early. Procuring and moving a mobile home to the site is the student's responsibility. All inquiries should be directed to the Registrar's office. The sites are provided with water and sewage connections. Municipal taxes, power, oil/gas and telephone are billed directly to the occupants.

Wives of married students are encouraged to enroll in classes whenever it is possible to do so. Tuition fees for classes are charged according to the number of hours per week the class is taught. There is no fee for auditing classes. However, anyone taking classes must register with the office.

Children of students and staff attend our local schools. At the present time there is a good Christian School associated with the People's Church three kilometers from NBBI with classes for kindergarten to grade six.
